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DRESS CODE FOR MUSKETEERS

Guidance for the Musketeers of the Citty of London Brigade

The purpose of this document is to share the aims and ambitions of the Citty of London Brigade with its current members, new members and potential members looking for advice and guidance on what equipment is suitable for their chosen role. The main aim is to diversify our appearance under our individual regimental coats. Sombre coloured clothing is always likely to be suitable – greys, greens, browns etc. (*imagine anything created by a vegetable dye*).

We have prioritised certain items as they are the most important to get a new member involved with the regiment as soon as possible. We unashamedly have put authentic shoes first – they are expensive, but they are the single most important item in the authentic presentation of the regiment. Please support this decision by lending kit to new members thus minimising initial expense. We have also defined Parade and Battle Order. Parade Order is where we are doing displays and ‘*showing off*’ – Battle Order will be stripped out and ready for fighting!

PARADE ORDER – MUSKET

FIRST LEVEL EQUIPMENT

- Closed Latchet shoes, Pikeman’s boots or Start-ups – *please try to get footwear first if you are a new member, the rest of your equipment can be borrowed to start with.*
- Regimental Coat – patched is ok but not torn. Patches should either match the coat or be muted natural colours. *Available from your Regimental Seamstress.*
- A hat – black felt, English cap or Montero - various styles are acceptable. (*To be approved by your Divisional Officer*)
- Singlet – muted colours, wooden, cloth or pewter buttons. (*A doublet of the same colour as your breeches can be worn instead of a Singlet*)
- Plain linen / natural coloured shirt with collar or if collarless a jabot (*a linen strip approx. 3 inches wide and 36 inches long worn around the neck like a modern day cravat*). Coloured shirts should not be worn – keep them for off the field and out of the view of the public.
- Breeches – of a dark or sombre natural colour – patched is ok but not torn. Patches should be muted natural colours. (*Dark blue and black breeches will be reserved for commissioned Officers as these are the richest dyes*).
- Hose should be knitted wool, woollen cloth or linen. Colours should be natural and subdued. Cotton hose can be worn under woollen hose, if you need the comfort, but must not be seen.
- Leg ties should be cloth, linen or inkle loom woven wool. No modern fabrics or ribbons.
- Leather gauntlets – muted natural colours (*Welders gloves are not acceptable*).

- Snapsack, leather or heavy duty canvass or linen (*Make sure it has something in it to give it shape. Items that support the story of your 17th Century persona could be carried in it? Maybe a blanket or spare clothing*).
- A set of Bandoliers – either of a plain finish or New Model Armie issue with blue powder flasks. (*Ideally a set of each but start with the plain set for versatility*)
- A powder flask for priming your musket. (*Or as an alternative for carrying spare powder if you are using the priming bottle on the bandoleer*)
- A matchlock musket. (*Flintlocks, carbines etc may be carried with the approval of your Divisional Officer but it should be born in mind that we should predominantly be carrying matchlock muskets*)
- Water bottle – hung over the shoulder. (*Recommended for safety purposes as much as for drinking*)

SECOND LEVEL EQUIPMENT

- Sword in scabbard hung from either a sword belt or baldric – when choosing items they should be appropriate for the rank and social status of the person you are portraying. (*If in doubt seek guidance from your Divisional Officer*)
- Other bags & pouches for person items and equipment to maintain a matchlock musket.

EXTRA EQUIPMENT

- Appealing to musketeer's interest in staying alive we might expect to see additional weapons – cudgels, clubs, daggers, knives etc. Make sure that anything sharp is safely sheathed to prevent accidental injury to either you or the public.
- Will you have food with you? If so how will you carry it and keep it clean? Will you have cooking equipment with you?
- Will you have a bedroll to sleep on? Maybe a blanket can be used to keep you warm and dry when on camp? Mute vegetable dye colours are most suitable – avoid bright colours.
- Will you have spare kit with you? Spare shoes, clothing?
- Maybe you have a little business selling something whilst in the camp – a small selection of fruit and vegetables on a bit of cloth makes you a greengrocer – a few beeswax candles makes you a candle maker; think of your own role and bring the kit.
- What about games to gamble on? Dice, cards etc expect to be berated by the Regimental Preacher!
- Is your character religious? A bible? Can you read?
- Drinking tankards for common soldiers are more likely to have been leather or wooden rather than pewter.
- What personal items do you have – a love token from a sweetheart? A horn comb? A horn drinking cup? A whetstone for sharpening knives, weapons etc? A purse with some coins? Some cutlery?
- Pamphlets – are you educated, maybe an apprentice? Flint and steel for setting a fire complete with kindling? A clay pipe and a little tobacco? Needle and thread to repair equipment on the march?
- Do you have an even bigger secret – are you a woman serving in the ranks? There is historical precedent for Hammonds to have women serving in the regiment of 1645. This could make an interesting story.
- Use authentic political and free religious slogans and statements to personalise your equipment – remember we are representing an army that are very much committed to the causes of Parliament.

BATTLE ORDER - MUSKET DIVISION

Battle Order for the musket will include a hat – black felt, English cap or Montero, bandoliers, water bottle, bags and pouches for working a matchlock musket and rest (*during pre '45 persona*), and snapsack over usual redcoat, breeches, woollen hose/linen boot hose, shirt with collar or jabot, gauntlets, latched shoes, pikeman's boots or start-ups.
